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INTRODUCTION

It is suggested that alongside this liturgy you have a means to listen to the suggested hymns which have links to videos with lyrics within this document. There is a mixture of traditional hymns and contemporary worship songs. If you do not know the tune then why not listen to the hymn/song and worship through reading the words alone.

The service is designed to used easily by one person. If there is more than one person participating, either one can lead with others joining in with the responses in **bold** OR everyone present may join in with all the words.

The sections in *red italics* are rubrics: these explain what needs to happen at various points.

THE WORD OF GOD

Hear what God is saying to his people according to Ezra.

Then rose up the heads of the fathers' houses of Judah and Benjamin, and the priests and the Levites, everyone whose spirit God had stirred to go up to rebuild the house of the Lord that is in Jerusalem. ⁶ And all who were about them aided them with vessels of silver, with gold, with goods, with beasts, and with costly wares, besides all that was freely offered. ⁷ Cyrus the king also brought out the vessels of the house of the Lord that Nebuchadnezzar had carried away from Jerusalem and placed in the house of his gods. ⁸ Cyrus king of Persia brought these out in the charge of Mithredath the treasurer, who counted them out to Sheshbazzar the prince of Judah. ⁹ And this was the number of them: 30 basins of gold, 1,000 basins of silver, 29 censers, ¹⁰ 30 bowls of gold, 410 bowls of silver, and 1,000 other vessels; ¹¹ all the vessels of gold and of silver were 5,400. All these did Sheshbazzar bring up, when the exiles were brought up from Babylonia to Jerusalem.

THE SERMON

Today, we continue our journey through the book of Ezra. Last time, we discovered that the Jews had been in exile for nearly sixty years but a new beginning was just around the corner as King Cyrus of Persia, stirred up by God, proclaimed that the Jews could return once more to Jerusalem and rebuild the temple. This reminded us of the sovereignty of God, how ultimately he is in control of the overall direction of this world, even if we cannot always see it and that he uses earthly leaders to accomplish this. But more than this, we saw how our situation today is like that of the Jews in Ezra's time - it is a time of opportunity. Our absence from our church buildings provides us with an opportunity to reflect on our practices, to rediscover and repair our relationship with God where it has become broken or distorted, to reaffirm our identity as God's people, and to return to the heart of worship.

The key word from last time was 'opportunity' but this week we discover that just because there is an opportunity does not mean that it will be easy to take advantage of it. The main reasons that opportunities pass us by are because of our feelings, our self-belief, and our resources.

OUR FEELINGS

There are many instances across history where new opportunities or good ideas have struggled to come to fruition or to make an impact because of how they were received. Very few changes are received with universal acclaim. Just think about the NHS, today it is something that we would not be without. However, when it was first proposed in 1946 it was faced with such fierce opposition that in was not put into law until two years later - even doctors were opposed to it! We find a similar situation in Ezra. Although the opportunity to return to Jerusalem was a good thing, not all of the Jews were keen to go.

There are many reasons why people are against change and usually it is driven by our feelings. For the Jews there would have been four feelings that they might have experienced in preparation for this opportunity, this new beginning - fear, comfort, doubt, and ignorance. The journey back to Jerusalem would have been long and dangerous crossing hostile lands - I would not be surprised if some were afraid. Coupled with that is the comfort they have in Babylon. Yes, they are exiled and under someone else's rule, but compared to returning to a ruined city, devastated farmlands, and no real protection it would certainly be the more comfortable option to stay in exile. Often such comfort and fear can lead to doubts. When we are comfortable in a situation it is very easy to doubt that things would be better off somewhere else and when we are afraid, doubts over success against the odds can creep in - the Jews most likely would have felt similarly. Finally, some Jews would have been ignorant over exactly how great an opportunity returning from exile was! The Jews had been in exile for nearly sixty years meaning a large

number of them would have known nothing other than life in exile. This means that they would have been heavily or entirely influenced by Babylonian culture. These "Babylonian Jews" would have known little about the glory days of Jerusalem or seen any evidence of God's provision for them. They were ignorant over the great opportunity the return from exile represented.

Ultimately, not all the Jews returned from exile, certainly not in the first instance.. Only those 'whose spirit God has stirred' (Ez. 1:5) returned from exile. It is the same for us when God presents us with new opportunities like we are facing presently. Some of us will be 'stirred up' by God and immediately see this new opportunity that being prevented from worshipping in our buildings presents and want to do things differently so we can grow in our relationship with God, be his witness to our communities in a new way, and meet him afresh once again. Others of us will be more resistant to such change, be it out of fear, comfort, doubt or ignorance or perhaps just wanting to keep things the same - why fix what isn't broken?! But God is always calling us to grow in our faith (2 Pt. 3:18), just because you feel that nothing needs to change does not mean that God is not wanting to do something different with his Church.

Do not worry if you are not stirred up with the prospect of change, of new opportunities to do church differently, this does not mean that God is leaving you behind. God still loves you and wants to know you and you to know him. Not all of the exiled returned from Babylon right away, there were three waves of returning exiles - in fact, Ezra himself was not in the first wave of returning exiles! It can take time to see where God is calling each of us (and some see it more clearly than others) but he is always wanting us to grow in our knowledge and love for him. Continue to read God's word, to pray, and to worship him for if we continue to be faithful and seek to know God then he will lead us to where he is calling us, even if we do not notice it! If you are excited about this time of change and the opportunities it presents then share that with people, use it it to 'encourage one another and build one

another up' (1 Thes. 5:11), bring your ideas to the ministry team or church wardens who would be happy to hear what God is revealing to you. When we share where God is calling us it can bring so much hope and in turn be used by God to 'stir up' something inside those who are yet to see God's vision for themselves.

OUR SELF-BELIEF

If the first reason opportunities pass us by is because of our feelings about change then the second is our self-belief. All too often there is a good idea only for a lack of self-belief to prevent anything coming from it. We tell ourselves that we do not have enough people, or that we do not speak eloquently enough, or that we are too old to do what God is calling us to. But throughout God's relationship with this world he has not used those who we might perceive to be most able but instead uses unlikely people to work out his purposes. Think about it, Sarah thinks herself too old to have children but through her God creates the nation of Israel (Gen. 15:1-6; 21:1-70), Gideon's army is reduced by God from over 30,000 people to only 300 to successfully defeat the Midianites (Jgs 6-8), one of the greatest evangelists of all time, the apostle Paul, was an awful public speaker (2 Cor. 11:6), and in the person of Jesus Christ all of creation is redeemed from sin through his death and resurrection. God reveals his power in weakness!

In a similar manner, God chose only a remnant to return from exile at this time to reveal his power and sovereignty. This remnant of Israel would not have been able to much in their own strength. Numbering only around 50,000 people in the first wave (the size of an average town) it was hardly a workforce ready to rebuild a city the size and grandeur of Jerusalem - let alone defend it. In fact, ask anyone who has been in charge of getting a group of people from A-B and they will tell you that just making the journey home would have been impressive! The fact they they managed this return successfully in such a weakened state showed the Jews, as well as the surrounding nations, that God was at work.

We should not be dismayed at the numbers, or the age, or the eloquence of speech of those we have to take advantage of the opportunity God has laid before us. When we act in faith God will take our weakness and achieve his purposes with it revealing his power and glory through it. Our self-belief should not stop us from taking full advantage of the opportunity that returning to our church buildings can be because God reveals his power in weakness.

OUR RESOURCES

But in this revelation of God's power he still uses his people, it is not something that we can just sit back and relax thinking "God will sort it all out" - we still have a role to play. God reveals his power through us, not apart from us so we still have a role to play. In Ezra we read that the returning Jews were supported by 'all who were about them' (Ez. 1:6). So, even those we spoke about earlier who did not return from exile in the first wave for one reason or another still gave 'silver', 'gold', 'goods', 'beasts', and 'costly wares' to support those who were returning alongside 'all that was freely offered' which refers to gifts given for the temple. They did not just send them off with hopeful wishes and good thoughts but provided them with much needed resources for their journey and for the rebuilding of the devastated land they would return to.

We may not always catch the vision or see the direction that God is moving his people but we should always be supportive of those who are acting faithfully in doing God's work - particularly in financing it. Giving of our finances reveals not only where our priorities lie, but also where our faith lies. Are we holding on to our money because our faith is not that important to us? Are we not giving because we do not have faith that God's people will use the money for God's glory or do we not have faith that God will sustain us if we make ourselves poorer by giving to his Church? I understand that we are living in exceptional times and that for some of us our finances are more stretched than ever, but it is the same with our churches. If you regularly give via the collection

plate then perhaps you could consider setting up a standing order instead as it will provide us with a regular income to continue doing God's work in our benefice - just email Revd Guy, your church wardens, or your PCC treasurer for more details on how to do this. If you cannot do this then set up your own offering plate in your own home (it could be a Pringles tube, a biscuit tin - anything really!) and put your offering in every Sunday or whenever you worship God and then bring that offering with you when we can all meet again. As I said earlier, God can use what we might perceive as weakness for his glory so please give whatever you can in these financially difficult times. It is through the generosity of God's people that they are enabled to take advantage of the opportunities that God presents them and so it is through your generosity that the church is enabled to worship, and grow in the love and knowledge of God.

Our feelings, self-belief, and resources can often be obstacles to taking advantage of the opportunities that God presents us with that we discussed in our examination of Ezra 1:1-4: to rediscover our identity as God's people, to repair where our faith and practice has become distorted or unfaithful, and so to return to the heart of worship - God himself. But, God can turn weakness into strength, and although these are difficult obstacles to overcome and may be harder for some than others, all things are possible with God. So encourage one another with the vision God has given you, have faith that God will work in our weakness, and give generously so the church can go where God is leading it.

AN ASIDE: A LINK TO THE PAST

I have one final thing to share from the passage that we read today. It is not linked with the thrust of the rest of the sermon but may go some way to allay the fears that some may have around all this talk of change. I am aware that throughout this series so far I have spoken a lot about opportunity and change but have not given any concrete idea as to what this may look like. That is in part because I do not know, and partly because, as a benefice,

COVID-19 to one side, we are already in a time of change as we are in vacancy and as a curate in training I do not think it my place to set such a vision. However, I do believe that God is going to use this time as a time to change and to grow his Church but I do not believe that this will mean that everything will change beyond recognition. In Ezra 1:7 we see that although the return from exile is a great opportunity for the Jews to rediscover their identity as God's people, repair their faith where it has been damaged in exile, and to return to the heart of worship in the temple, they are not making wholesale changes - they are not throwing the baby out with the bathwater as it were. The Jews bring back with them the sacred 'vessels of the house of the Lord' (Ez. 1:7), the vessels that they had used in the temple since the time of Solomon. So do not think of this opportunity as a time for change, but for a time of restoration, where we can refocus on what is important in our faith, our worship, our mission, and our evangelism. This will mean retaining a lot of what we have, but also replacing some things so we can best follow where God is leading us.

and bring the whole created order to worship at your feet;
for you are alive and reign with the Father
and the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever. **Amen**.
