

INTRODUCTION

THE SERMON

THE 'SEASON OF CREATION'

In case you haven't realised yet, this month here in the Benefice we have been celebrating the season of creation, a celebration of the world in which we live and of God, our creator. We have looked and the topics of the land and the water, seeing how they are a blessing to us but also examining our responsibility as Christians to be stewards of God's creation.

Why should we be good stewards, caring for the world around us? Because when we do, God is glorified. When we tend to creation people see God's power and creativity as they ponder how such something as beautiful and complex as a flower or tree could come into existence. When we help those who do not have access to clean drinking water or we seek to prevent our green spaces being abused, doing so in the name of Christ, then we reveal God's justice and love for the world. When we care for the world God is glorified.

CREATION AND MISSION

God's glorification through our stewardship of creation means

that there is a connection between creation and mission. In fact, the two are so closely connected that one of the Church of England's 5 marks of mission is "To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth." With such a link it should come as no surprise to hear that all of the gospels take time to mention the natural world either in their description of events, or in the words of the parables of Jesus, in fact, according to a recent study there are over 2300 references to the environment in Matthew's gospel alone. So it should come as no surprise that the Bible has something to say about one of the biggest environmental issues of our time - climate change.

CLIMATE CHANGE AND THE GOSPEL

With unseasonably warm weather and the increase in extreme weather events like flooding and droughts, the wildfires in Australia earlier this year and in the United States right now, the impact of climate change on this world is hard to ignore. God's creation is hurting after years of neglect and abuse at the hands of humanity. Christians have not been good stewards of creation.

But these events do not only affect the world in which we live but also the people who live within it. For example, droughts lead to food shortages which lead to the increase in the cost of living which has the greatest impact on the poorest among us; or take floods as another example, floods lead to the pollution of water supplies which lead to waterborne diseases which lead to illness and loss of income. A lack of care for creation means a lack of care for others.

The events that have been brought about because of climate change have had the effect of increasing the disparity between the worlds richest and poorest. Whereas droughts, floods, and fires, occur across the world and are devastating no matter your wealth or status the wealthy have the advantage of being able to rebuild homes more quickly and to buy in food from other places to replace a poor harvest, those without that wealth or who live in countries without the infrastructure to help those most affected,

will be feeling the damaging effects of climate change for a much longer time. As someone said recently, we are all in the same storm, but we are not all in the same boat, some are in a better position to deal with the effects of climate change than others.

That is why caring for the world and climate change is a gospel issue. If care for the environment reflects on how well we love the lord our God with all our heart, soul, and mind (Mt 22:37) as a response to creation being a gift from God to us, then taking climate change seriously reflects on on how well we love our neighbour as ourself (Mt 22:39). These are described by Jesus the greatest commandments and so to follow them is to be a witness to Christ.

SALT, LIGHT, AND CREATION

This brings us nicely to our gospel reading this morning. It is a very familiar passage to us all I am sure, Jesus' declaration that we are 'the salt of the earth' and 'the light of the world.' It is a fairly straight forward passage to understand, calling on us to be noticeably different to the world in such a manner that the world can come to know who God is. But we often miss how wide-reaching this call to be salt and light is and the extent to which it affects every aspect of our lives. I wonder if you have ever made the connection between this passage and our care for the environment? Given that the words 'earth' and 'world' are used within the passage it is amazing how often we miss the connection between being salt and light and our stewardship of the environment.

Part of our being the salt of the earth and the light of the world is found in our care for creation. It makes senses really doesn't it? Being salt and light means witnessing to the love and grace of God through our words and deeds to others so that they can taste and see the goodness of God. As I mentioned earlier, caring for the world and addressing climate change is a working out of Jesus' summary of the greatest commandments, an act of witness to God's love for the world, and so our treatment of

creation is directly connected to how we are salt and light.

The sacrificial work of Jesus Christ and the teachings he left us show that part of the expectation of being his followers is to care more for others than for ourselves and that includes the environment. So when we do not care for rivers and oceans, we lose some of our saltiness; when we do not stand against the driving of animals towards extinction, our light dims; when we ignore the impact climate change and do not change our lifestyles accordingly, we hide our light under a basket.

I am not saying that caring for the environment is the only way for us to be the salt of the earth, but what I am saying is that all of our actions as Christians reflect on our saltiness. If we share God's love by caring for the homeless or the hungry in his name then we are being salt of the earth, but if we then pollute God's world through unnecessary driving, or littering, or leaving lights on all day then we damage all the work that we have done, we start to look like those who care for some of the things that God cares for but not others. That is not what Jesus has called us to and instead damages our ability to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world. We cannot ignore the warning of Jesus that salt which has lost its saltiness is 'no longer good for anything' (Mt. 5:13) and so in being salt and light we need to broaden our approach and this includes looking at the issue of creation care.

GOD IS ALREADY AT WORK

So what does being salt and light look like today when we think about creation? Regardless of our passion for the created world being salt and light has always been linked to the kingdom of God. The passage we heard today comes immediately after the beatitudes, which are in essence the manifesto of the kingdom of God. The role of Christians as salt and light cannot be detached from this. Jesus also declares that we should 'let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven.' When we take these two items together then we cannot escape the fact that our actions

must overtly point people to the kingdom of God so that it brings him glory.

Our care for creation and our tackling of climate change needs to bring glory to God and so it needs to be distinct from the rest of the environmental movement that is sweeping the world right now for only then can we be salt and light. But although there is a need to be distinctive it does not mean we have to be doing something new. One way of looking at mission is to acknowledge that God is already at work in the world and that our mission is to go where he is already. This means that we can look at movements like Extinction Rebellion or people like Greta Thunberg and see God at work.

The non-violent protests and marches of Extinction Rebellion are somewhat reminiscent of Christ's work in exposing oppressive societal laws through assertive non-violence. For example later in Matthew's gospel we have the famous phrase 'if anyone strikes you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also.' At first reading this would seem to imply passivity, but it is actually an act of defiance. You see, at the time of Jesus the Jews would only strike with the right hand, (as the left hand was only to be used for unclean tasks), this would make striking the right cheek next to impossible except for a derogatory backhanded slap. This context reveals that those who were being struck in Jewish society were usually those who were oppressed and thought less of such as slaves or women or children. When Jesus says to "turn to him the other also" it forces the attacker to use their fist rather than the back of their hand. In doing this the attacker has no way of asserting their dominance any more, they cannot put the individual back in their place with a derogatory slap. The slave is standing against the master forcing himself to be treated as an equal in an act of assertive non-violence. If a whole crowd of people started doing this then there would have been a social revolution as the powerful could no longer belittle or dehumanise the other. Such behaviour brings those in power to a point of reflection as they are forced to think about their actions and once

they are thinking there is a chance for change.

This is what Extinction Rebellion and other peaceful environmental activists are doing, in protesting in a way that disrupts daily life, that forces those in power to listen and reflect, and hopefully make lasting change that saves our planet.

SHOW THEM GOD

But we can only see Christ in these actions and God working through them because we already know him and can see his power at work. We know that our creator cares for his world, that he cares for the rivers, the land, the animals, and those who are affected by climate change, but others do not. They see Extinction Rebellion as a secular movement and Greta Thunberg as a social and environmental activist. If we acknowledge that God is working through these people and movements then our role is to make sure people see that God is in them too! We need to shine a light on God's role in all of this.

So yes, go to an Extinction Rebellion march, (in fact research shows that acts of non-violent protest such as these marches are by far and a way the most effective way of making lasting change), but go with a group of Christians from your local church or meet up with those who are part of Christian Climate Action, a group of Christians who support Extinction Rebellion. Make banners that instead of saying "11 years to save the earth" say something like "God cares for this world, let's care for it too" or "God's creation is crying out". Be salt and light at these events and show the world God and his people care about his creation. Who knows, with the environment being such a high profile issue across the nation you may even be able to help bring others who do not know God along to such an event and share with them God's love for creation and God's love for them.

As those who love God and love our neighbour, let us take climate change seriously and act before it is too late. But in all the acts we do on behalf of God's creation, let us make sure that God is glorified so we can be the salt of the earth and the light of the world. Amen.
