

INTRODUCTION

Welcome to our Morning Worship here at the Parish churches of Coxley with Godney, Henton, and Wookey. Although we are once again meeting together physically in our church buildings we understand that some people might not be able to attend for any number of reasons. It is hoped that following this liturgy, knowing that others in the benefice will be doing so at the same time, might help provide a spiritual connection between us and bring about a sense of community between the followers of Jesus Christ.

THE SERMON

THE 'SEASON OF CREATION'

Within the Church of England we celebrate a variety of seasons, from Advent, Epiphany, Lent, and Easter, which celebrate the life of Jesus, to the celebration of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and within all this runs the thread of the work of God the Father. But we do not have a particular season to celebrate God the Father. This, to me is a great shame, the Bible reveals to us so many different attributes of God that are worthy of celebrating - his love, his power, his mercy, his justice, to name but a few.

So this year, I thought we would rectify the situation, not for the whole of the Church of England, but certainly for our benefice. Every year within the benefice we celebrate Harvest on one Sunday, usually in September. Well this year we are going to extend that celebration and join in with the 'Season of Creation' celebrating both creation and our Creator. September 1st was the world day of prayer for the care of creation and the day that formally started the Season of Creation. It is ecumenical celebration which runs from the 1st September to the celebration of the Feast of St Francis of Assisi on the 4th October.

Over this season, within this benefice, we shall be looking at the themes of land, water, climate change, and sufficiency, all in relation to the world that we have been given by God starting this week with the land.

THE LAND

Land is something that we both live on and live off, it is of fundamental importance to our daily existence, without it our homes would have no firm foundations and our tables would be bare. Within the Bible it takes a similar position of primacy with the very chapter of the Bible describing the creation of the world and then throughout the Old Testament the land being described as a gift to God's people. Whether it is the promised

land for Abraham and his descendants, or the return to the land for the Israelites in exile it is a theme that we cannot ignore.

But it is a theme that has too often been distorted. Our reading this morning from Genesis I has been used as justification for the exploitation of land for centuries. The misuse of the phrase "fill the earth and subdue it" and the description of mankind having "dominion over" creation have led to mankind doing what serves them best, without a care for the rest of creation. With more species than ever on the brink of extinction due to hunting or the destruction of habitats, land producing fewer crops due to intensive farming methods, and air pollution getting increasingly worse, we do not need to look far to see humanity's abuse of creation.

All of this creation abuse, this destruction of the world that God made for us to dwell in, can all be traced back to us. It can be traced to our selfishness, to our self-centeredness, to our sinfulness. Whether we damage creation deliberately or out of ignorance, the root of this selfish behaviour is us and our sin. Put simply, sin is the elevation of ourselves, our needs, desires, our preferences, at the expense of all others be it other humans, God, or the world. So when we read verses that speak of "subduing" creation and having "dominion" over it our default position is one of sinful abuse for our own gain. We abuse creation because of our sin.

HUMAN REDEMPTION? THE WORLD'S REDEMPTION?

But thankfully our sin has been dealt with and so we have hope for humanity's care for creation once more. Through the crucifixion, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus Christ into heaven, death, the consequence of sin, has been defeated and we are no longer prisoners to our sinfulness. We have been saved by the blood of Christ and all who trust in him will receive the gift of eternal life. But with this story of redemption and salvation there is a tendency in the world today to make it all about us, "I am saved", "God saved me", "Jesus is my saviour". Our tendency towards sin even manages to make salvation about us. And it is about us, Paul in his letter to the church in Corinth says: 'For our

sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God' (2 Co 5:21). Christ took on our sin so that we might be saved. Salvation is about us, but it is not all about us.

When we look across the Bible we see that salvation is not limited to humanity but extends across all of creation. Take the Old Testament and the account of Noah and the flood, not only does God save Noah's family but the animals too and his salvation extends to the land as well as after the flood subsides God promises to 'never again curse the ground' (Gen. 8:21). At the end of the book of Jonah, God takes pity on the city of Nineveh, a city God describes as containing 'more than 120, 00 persons who do not know their right hand from their left, and also much cattle' (Jon. 4:11). Again we see God's mercy extending to both humanity and animals. Now, you may questions these accounts saying that it is a peculiarity of the Old Testament, that that was what salvation looked like before Jesus and that salvation is different now, but that is not the case. Let's look at one of the most famous verses in the whole Bible - John 3:16 - a verse that is often quoted for its depiction of God's offering of salvation for all humanity.

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life.

Now you may already see where I am going with this. In this passage the word for world is *kosmos* which refers to the whole of creation, everything worldly, not just people. And this concept is not just isolated to John's gospel, in 2 Cor 5:19 we find the same word *kosmos* used to describe God's work of reconciliation, in Colossians 1:20 Jesus Christ is described as the one who reconciles all things to God. God's plan is to restore and save all of creation, not just humanity.

GOD'S PLAN FOR US AND FOR CREATION

The book of Revelation speaks about God's kingdom coming in its fullness, God's kingdom is here now, we are building it, but it will

be completed when Christ returns. This coming kingdom is one where God renews all of creation, this is the promised redemption and salvation of the land (Rev. 21:5) we have heard about earlier today. But the promise of the redemption of the land and the promise that God will make all things new when his kingdom comes in power is not an excuse for us to abuse the world now. We cannot think with such a disposable mindset. Yes, the world will be made new. Yes, it will be a perfect creation once more; but our calling as Christians is to bring glory to God and to be witnesses to his kingdom on earth here and now. As such we should be a community whose aim is to live lives according to God's kingdom as best we can, by sharing the good news of Jesus Christ, by confronting injustice, by becoming more mature disciples, by growing in our relationship with God, and by caring for creation. If you take any of these things to their perfect completion then you get a picture of what heaven is like everyone knows Jesus, there is no more injustice, we are mature in our faith, we have a perfect relationship with God, and the world is made new - this is what we are called to witness to! For today though, we will focus only on our witness to God through creation. If God's final plan for his kingdom involves the restoration of creation then we need to be those who steward the land and look after creation as part of our witness to God's kingdom and God's rule here on earth.

OUR PREROGATIVE

Although God 'makes the springs gush forth' and 'causes the grass to grow for the livestock' as the psalmist describes in Psalm 104, God does not care for creation by himself but, as we read in Genesis 1 today, we have been given 'dominion' over all the earth and so we have a role to play. But this role needs to be understood in relation to the story of redemption.

As I have said already today, we understand the domination of creation by humanity as something that is for our own benefit and we understand it this way because of our sinfulness. But

when we look back at this through the story of redemption then we see that creation is not ours but God's. When we understand creation in this way, then we see ourselves as stewards, not rulers, looking after the world until it is made new with the coming of God's kingdom.

When we have the perspective of a steward we can start to understand our role in caring for creation, we can understand what subduing the earth and having dominion over it means. It means we subdue the earth according to God's rule. When we look at the parables Jesus taught we can see that God knows that creation needs to be subdued - it requires pruning for it to good growth. Not only that but if we care for creation then we are bringing glory to God because we are doing his work and showing the world the wonder and beauty of God's creation. That is why I think it is important for us to take care of the green spaces in our communities, so that people might see the beauty of creation and get a taste of who God is. As a church we can work with our local parish councils to campaign for the safeguarding of green spaces from development, we can work alongside them to clear rubbish from footpaths and playing fields. Closer to home, we can look after our gardens and churchyards to bring glory to God. In this strange time, more and more people are meeting outside, more and more people are walking around our villages. What an opportunity we have to show off the wonder of God's creation, to share with people that we're looking after our world until God makes it new once more.

You may know that to keep the congregations in our churches safe we are no longer holding services of morning prayer on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays. But, in light of it being the season of creation and our calling to steward creation, I will be using that time to look after our churchyards. So on Monday morning I will be in Henton tidying up the garden of remembrance, on Tuesday, I will be in Wookey weeding the flower beds, and on Wednesday I will be in Coxley, clearing the overgrown grass from our footpaths. You are all welcome to join

me (as outside more of us can gather safely!) and let us make this Season of Creation one where we each steward creation as part of our gospel witness and bring glory to God through our natural world.
